Preliminary census data is out and our population grew just 7.4% during the decade which is the slowest rate on record other than Great Depression. Approximately half of the growth came from the Latino population. Results show stronger growth in urban areas, but this was all pre-pandemic and does not reflect how Covid has reshaped where people live.

Last week I wrote again about the increasing issue of labor supply in our economy. Since then, the labor department reported that there were 10.1 million open jobs at end of June up from 9.2 million in May. "The jump came as the quits rate increased while the layoffs and discharges rate was unchanged, reflecting increased bargaining power and employment options for workers." job-openings-surge-above-10-million-for-first-time-ever. One thing the shortage will drive is the use of technology. For tasks that are repetitive and require little judgment, technology will be introduced. Your French fries at White Castle in some places are now being cooked by a robot. restaurant-robots-kitchen-labor-shortage.

Make sure the technology underneath your website is good. Google increasing the important of "user experience" when it decides how to rank results in a search. From WSJ: "A new "page experience" update from Alphabet Inc.'s Google that will be introduced to all users by the end of August aims to cut down on frustrating episodes like those. If two websites are identical in every other way, the one that launches faster, jiggles around less when loading and lets users interact with it more quickly will be placed higher in Google Search. These three metrics, which Google calls core web vitals, will let the company rate a page's user experience, alongside existing Google measurements of how mobile-friendly it is, whether its connection is secure and whether it contains intrusive elements such as pop-ups".

Personally, I don't think NASDAQ should be telling companies who should be on their board. The exchange's new diversity rule got blessed by the SEC. Under the rule, companies must have at least two diverse directors, including one who self-identifies as female and one who self-identifies as either an underrepresented minority or LGBTQ+. Shareholders should decide the board composition and not Nasdaq.

Decent overall leadership article in Inc. (great-leadership-brutal-truths) laid out these Top 7 actions of leaders:

- 1. Leaders must face conflict to solve problems
