

Women are starting "No Clubs" to help manage their careers by saying no to work unrelated to their specific function. "These non-promotable tasks... they matter to the organization, but you don't get rewarded for doing them," said Linda Babcock, an economics professor at Carnegie Mellon University and co-author of "The No Club: Putting a Stop to Women's Dead-end Work." "Not everything counts on your performance evaluations – there's lots of work that is done that is never tracked, thanked or evaluated." When we have a non-promotable job to do, we think of women first and we ask them more than men," said Babcock. According to research she conducted with three other professors, managers are 50% more likely to ask a woman than a man to do these invisible tasks. She also found that women are also more likely to volunteer for these tasks." Talking about things like taking notes in a meeting or sitting on an employee engagement committee. non-promotable-work-saying-no.

Important to remember that the overturning of Roe v Wade was about decision rights. The court opinion does not "criminalize abortion" as one reporter commented. To quote the majority opinion directly: "It is time to heed the Constitution and return the issue of abortion to the people's elected representatives. Casey, 505 U. S., Scalia.... That is what the Constitution and the rule of law demand."

With all of the coverage of Roe v Wade, I was curious how many abortions happen in the US each year. It is not officially tracked but is estimated between 620k and 900k (pewresearch/what-the-data-says-about-abortion-in-the-u-s). To put that in perspective, here are the leading causes of death from 2020 (don't infer I am making an anti-abortion argument about "death" just getting volumes in context). cdc.gov/nchs/fastats/leading-causes-of-death

Heart disease: 696,962Cancer: 602,350COVID-19: 350,831

Accidents (unintentional injuries): 200,955
Stroke (cerebrovascular diseases): 160,264
Chronic lower respiratory diseases: 152,657
Alzheimer's disease: 134,242
Diabetes: 102,188

• Influenza and pneumonia: 53,544

• Nephritis, nephrotic syndrome, and nephrosis: 52,547

Probably a better way to look it is compared to the number of births every year. There were 3.6mm births in 2020 according to CDC (cdc.gov/nchs/fastats/births) so roughly one abortion for every 5-6 births. Surprisingly to me, 40.5% of these births were to unmarried parents with a mean female age of 27.1.

While I recognize that the recent Supreme Court decisions have angered a lot of people, I think it is great that we are having societal discussions about the constitution, rights and how we think government should work. It is not getting much attention but personally I think the case overturning EPA rulemaking might have a serious impact on how Washington regulates.
